Public figures require attention, whether from a constituency who votes them in or out of office, shareholders who decide their economic benefit to the corporation, or fans who judge their performances. However, on the periphery of this normal attention resides a very real risk; that of a much smaller group of individuals who lack the ability to discriminate between their own private fantasies and the figure's public behavior. They may be personally insulted by perceived betrayal, fanatically in love due to a perceived affectionate or sexual invitation, or simply preoccupied with the daily life of the public figure. Such individuals may fixate and do nothing more. Others communicate or approach in a disturbing way. A few will threaten. And on rare occasions, one will breach the public figure's security perimeter and attack. Stalking, Threatening, and Attacking Public Figures is a comprehensive survey of the current knowledge about stalking, violence risk, and threat management towards public figures. With contributions from forensic psychologists and psychiatrists, clinicians, researchers, attorneys, profilers, and

current and former law enforcement professionals, this book is the first of its kind, international in scope, and rich in both depth and complexity. The book is divided into three sections which, in turn, focus upon defining, explaining, and risk managing this increasingly complex global reality. Chapters include detailed case studies, analyses of quantitative data, reflections from attachment theory and psychoanalytic thought, descriptions of law enforcement and protective organization activities, mental health and psychiatric categorizations and understandings, consideration of risk assessment models and variables, victim perspectives, and others. The law enforcement profession is well aware of the need for performance-based management. Results are what count and programs are increasingly required to demonstrate that activities and programs are viable and worthy of budgetary support. This emphasizes the necessity of ensuring that the managerial processes foster accountability. To ensure success, it is essential that organizational leaders encourage and constantly supervise this management process. Performance improvement occurs when there is an ongoing process that creates strategic performance objectives, such as measures performance, collects, and analyses, which result in the reporting of performance data that can focus on improvement. The key chapter in the text is entitled "Accountability for Performance" inasmuch as it circumscribes the remainder of the concepts discussed, and reviews the necessity of creating an accountability environment fostered by positive communications. The pivotal aspects of accountability are discussed, and each of the five levels reviewed. Chapters deal with a range of potential evaluation tools to include logic models, crime mapping, program evaluation techniques, and problem solving. Considerable attention is given to performance measurement, the different types of measurement and commonly used measures in law enforcement. There is also a brief discussion of CompStat and its four principles with special emphasis on relentless follow-up and assessment. In addition, attention is given to the utilization of performance information and the research measurements that create process improvements. Within the proactive problem-solving process, the reader will find basic questions for the scanning process, objectives, means of defining a problem, environmental surveys, and the recognized sequence of analysis. Consideration is given to the discussion of data quality, verification, validation, and information sources. Law enforcement professionals, re-searchers, planners, policymakers, and stakeholders at all levels can use this text as a significant resource in the development of performance-based management that stresses accountability, competence and performance. First and foremost, before we begin discussing other important issues, we would like to take a short pause and address serious social issues we feel is prevalent and worthy of in-depth conversation. Let's get real. The nation is in social unrest. The community has little faith and trust in law enforcement and yet despite the conflict; have an expectation for law enforcement to continue confronting perilous situations day in and day out. Social media and the news highlight tragic incidents gone wrong at the hands of police. The dreadful encounters between subject and cop have brought dishonor to a profession held to a higher standard. Are some of the gone wrong scenarios motivated? Accidental? Intentional? ... Maybe yes...Maybe no. The authors take pride and honor when wearing their badge as they protect and serve. Are there bad apples in every barrel? The answer is yes, this

analogy is the same for all professions including law enforcement. However, as law enforcement professionals, our perspective is there are more good officers than the media publishes than the bad ones. The onset starting the authors' education began in Criminal justice primarily because we are in law enforcement. Yet upon completion of the Associate of Arts, we were left feeling as though the information (while significant) really did not play an active role directly related to our profession. We wanted to understand behavior. We hoped by taking psychology courses we could understand why people act and behave in the manner they do. So, we pursued our Bachelor of Science Degree in Psychology and continued with our Master of Science degree in Psychology. As we evolved and grew through our coursework, we began to have a new perspective and respect human behavior. The knowledge provided us with a new approach when responding to consumers afflicted with mental disorders, behavioral issues, addictive patterns and cultural sensitivity occurring daily in our job. Formal training specifically for Forensic Science is great if you looking to solve crimes, but it does not really help when dealing with the people coming in off the streets housed in the jail environment. We found by taking the various psychology curriculums over the course of years, provided us with a different set of glasses to wear, as opposed to thinking how I believe "normal" people should act and behave. It was like one day we got it, understanding the mind does not unfold itself in a normal manner, if it has been influenced from an array of biological, sociological, or addictions causing his or her way of thinking to be damaged. We stopped going in thinking as a law enforcement does on a day to day basis such as "my way or the highway". Once we realized there were realistic facts that cause people to act in certain ways, we then began to empathize. We began to listen and try to understand the way they thought before the way we reacted. Our way of approaching mental crises, behavioral issues, or cultural conflict within various populations has changed in a complete 360. Don't get us wrong, we do not have a warm a fuzzy approach, but we realize we have to be mindful how we approach different individuals once we learn to recognize symptoms and signs associated to mental illness. Traditional police academy training did not teach or prepare us how to properly engage or approach people in mental crises. We learned from years of on the job experience and our quest for higher knowledge to understand behavior as it relates to law enforcement. Our insight is the information police cadets should know before they ever graduate from the academy, put on a police uniform, and issued a gun but don't. Of those reports, child protective services substantiated abuse or neglect in nearly one million children -- an 18 percent increase since 1990. More than half the 1996 reports alleging maltreatment came from medical, social services, education, or law enforcement professionals, and almost two-thirds of the substantiated reports

were made by these professionals. As diagnostic expertise has increased, child care professionals face new responsibilities for recognizing the short-term and long-term consequences of childhood victimization and for effectively treating victims of the various forms of child maltreatment. Initial medical management, legal interventions, long-term medical management, and long-term management of developmental and psychological consequences are thoroughly covered, as are complicated issues such as treatment-resistant families, the treatment of offenders, forensic implications (including confidentiality), and the long-term consequences of childhood victimization. Especially as the public increasingly expects law enforcement to exhibit transparency and rapid responsiveness to community concerns, communications proficiency often has a significant impact on an agency's overall success. Public information officers (PIOs) and other staff with public communications responsibilities are often the focal point for this

engagement with communities, and it is vital that agencies use them effectively. Despite the importance of law enforcement PIOs, their needs have received relatively little attention. To better understand the needs of law enforcement with respect to PIOs, RAND researchers and the Police Executive Research Forum convened a workshop to identify high-priority needs to improve the law enforcement PIO profession. Through a series of interviews and group discussion sessions, the researchers gathered input from various subject-matter experts, who identified and prioritized a total of 26 needs related to PIOs. Of these 26, nine needs were identified as high-priority. These high-priority needs addressed issues related to responding to civil unrest; gauging community sentiment; engaging in rapid communication; establishing the value of PIOs beyond information dissemination to the public; developing guidance on characteristics of effective PIOs; proactively addressing community issues; effectively addressing community criticism; and building professional development opportunities and training for public communications staff. Despite its exceptionally wide adoption and its broad coverage, the New York Convention depends for its efficacy on the conduct of national actors, and national courts in particular. Depending on the view of international law prevailing in a given State, the Convention may require statutory implementation at the national level. Beyond that, the Convention requires of national courts an apt understanding of the principles and policies that underlie the Convention's various provisions.
