Wells, although it purports to be by the fictional character Reginald Bliss (Wells denied authorship for some time after the book was published). The book is about Bliss' thoughts on a book out of the fragmentary writings of George Boon. The book was notorious for including a literary assault on Henry James, mocking the authors writing style and characters. James and Wells were long time friends but had fallen out prior to WWI. But Wells doesn't stop there. He also mocks George Bernard Shaw and criticises Friedrich Nietzsche. To even things out, Wells also mocks himself, calling into question and ridiculing a notion he held dear; that of humanity's collective consciousness. Thomas Boon (d.1723) emigrated from England to Isle of Wight County, Virginia. Vol. 1 contains about 1,000 of his direct descendants. Vol. 2 contains genealogical and family history data regarding Boon individuals and families which are unidentified as to immigrant ancestor--arranged in alphabetical order by state, county, and given name.
